

EDITORIAL

A marque event on the Australian orienteering calendar, Easter 2021 has come and gone. Postponed from 2020 the unique terrain was a challenge for many. From the two elite classes (M and W21E) 74 started but just 28 (37%) completed the 3-day event. Compare this with the other end of the age scale (M and W75A) where 38 started and 27 finished (71%). There many and varied reasons for why runners DNF, but it does make an interesting comparison. Neil Barr's report and Bendigo member results are later in the newsletter. Also this month is the great news of Jim Russell being inducted into the OA Hall of Fame, a summary of coming events in Victoria, and a round-up of results from Anzac weekend events in South Australia. Over more than 40 years Jim has made a mammoth contribution to orienteering at local, state and national levels. As an elite competitor he was selected into the Australian Team for the 1991 World Orienteering Championships in (then) Czechoslovakia. In following years he became coach of JWOC and WOC teams as well as OA Head Coach.

In administration, Jim has held a range of positions on the OV Board and was Vice President for a number of years.

He has organized many events at local, state and national level and has become an expert in the application of technology to our sport. Congratulations Jim on a well-deserved honour and for your continuing contribution to

orienteering in Australia.

Easter Orienteering at Molong – from our foreign correspondent, Neil Barr

If you think the navigational challenge of the Bermuda Triangle at Kooyoora was top of the chart, then you haven't been to Gumble Pinnacles. After experiencing the area 15 or so years ago at a NSW Championship, we decided the chance to run again there at Easter was not to be missed. As always I approach Easter with an estimate of my best and worst probable result. The latter proved the most accurate. On both of the days at Gumble Pinnacle map I managed to get well confused. Imagine Kooyoora terrain. Now reduce visibility, and get rid of all those bare rock open areas that make such good attack points. Now add course setters whose main aim is to get you lost by setting a long leg through lots of rock detail into an area with no significant attack points.

Of course, the most impressive navigators managed to get through their courses with only modest errors. An error free run was a very rare event. Those crucial long legs often determined who was in the first or second half of the age group field. Each day I identified the leg that was the danger, navigated it perfectly and then relaxed on the next leg and managed to make a ten minute or greater error, thus proving that spiking the key leg of the course was no guarantee of success. It wasn't all doom and gloom in the household though. Julie had a clean run on the last day of Easter, so we made the longish trip home with some smiles in the car. Easter carnivals are more than orienteering. Here are some of the other highlights and low lights.

- Camping with a random selection of orienteers at the small Molong caravan Park. This is a good way to meet people.
- The lottery of dining out options in Molong. Some days the pubs and club weren't open. The only option then was "Chinese" and perhaps I should stop there.

Congratulations to all on completing the three days – there were many who didn't!
