# Mosquito Creek bites again!

The Mosquito Creek map with flat, subtle contours and little thick vegetation has often been the graveyard of the fast and furious. This time however it was a watercourse end, or to be more precise – two watercourse ends - that brought people undone.

Courses 1 and 2 at the August 13 event set by Terry Davidson both had control #96 as their second last control. Course 1 then had #94 as their last control whereas Course 2 had #97.

Of the seven competitors in Course 1, four punched #97 (north end of watercourse) and were disqualified, and of the 13 competitors in Course 2, one punched #94 (south end of watercourse) and was disqualified. The IOF rules for control placement stipulate that controls on the same feature must be more than 60m apart – they were.

Of course, nobody wishes to name and shame people, but the results are publicly available for perusal on Eventor!

The lesson from all this of course is - CHECK YOUR CONTROL CODES!

## OO Cup 2022, Sweden – Ted van Geldermalsen

Normally the OO Cup 5-day orienteering event is held in Slovenia but for this year the Slovenian organisers decided to run it around Umea in northern Sweden (perhaps to show the Swedes how to organise a 5-day orienteering event).

The areas, maps, and courses were right up to the organisers' usual high standard. The areas were almost all wilderness forest with lots of contour and rock detail and next to no tracks. All maps were 1:7,500 scale to help readability. Some days had remote finishes to avoid uninteresting legs back to the arena at the end of courses.

In the morning before the first race we walked around a training map to see an example of local forest. This didn't really help when we got to Race 1 in the afternoon. The first leg for M65 was a really tough one of about 500 metres distance and 60 metres of climb through cliffs and rocks and unfamiliar forest (see partial course below). I lost contact with the map and had to retrace part of the way. By this time the competitor who had started 6 minutes after me was coming up the slope. Seeing where he went helped me realise what I had been misinterpreting and I was able to get to control 1. I kept him in sight for the next two legs but then he ran away. Later on I saw that I had repassed him when he lost time on a control towards the end of the course and my time was only 3 minutes longer than his.

Over the following days no one had clean runs and the first three places changed from day to day while I stayed stuck in fourth overall by an increasing margin. Every day was a new and intense challenge from start to finish. A local Umea runner who was coming second after three days had a lot of trouble on day 4 and dropped to 3<sup>rd</sup> overall, about 6 minutes ahead of me.

On Day 5 (see partial course below), I had a good run, only losing a couple of minutes on two of the controls but didn't imagine it would change my overall place. We hopped in the car and drove 7 hours back to Stockholm. That evening we looked at the final results and I'd come third. The Umea runner had another bad day. Not only was his time thirteen minutes longer than mine but he had punched the wrong second last control and was disqualified. What a disappointing way to end 5 days good orienteering.



The first rule of OO Cup is "don't mispunch" because all 5 races count towards the overall result. Sometimes half of the class have mispunched by Day 5 so there is always hope, and so it proved for me this time. Placegetters prizes looked quite good so it was a little unfortunate that we hadn't stayed for the presentations.

Margi found the terrain very rough and after completing the Day 1 course she decided to spectate at the rest.

The event attracted about 1,000 competitors. The number of Swedish entries must have been disappointing – only 241. Almost as many people from France entered (237). There were six entries from Australia.

Next year the event returns to Slovenia and will be based around Lokve where we ran in our first OO Cup in 2011.
