Keeping our events happening ... By Neil Barr (President)

My first orienteering event was in mid-1992 on the Mandurang-Coolibah map. I still remember that day, starting out full of confidence that I could navigate... and ending up confused before the first control. After my bout of hubris, I recovered and finished the course and was hooked. Within a year I was attending the Easter and Championship carnivals.

That first event was over 30 years ago. Much has changed in the sport since then, and I wonder if perhaps our thinking about our local event management has kept up with these changes. Thirty years ago the club was organising 30 events each year, with a policy of one organiser and gear to be kept small enough to fit in one car boot. There were only four courses to set.

- Competitors found out about events by reading the newsletter.
- Controls were hanging kites and most organisers placed them on the morning of the event.
- Every event was "enter on the day", and entry fees were paid cash into a money box using an honour system.
- Between 40 and 50 people attended, and almost all were from Bendigo.
- The single organiser drew master maps for copying onto one of a large stock of mass printed maps without courses.
- Competitors drew their course on a map in competition time and managed their own timing.
- After the event the organiser spent quite some time typing up the results which were then included in a newsletter.
- The cash was counted, banked and reported by the treasurer to the club and levies were calculated manually and paid to the State Association.

Many aspects of event management have changed since then, but three stand out as causing profound changes to local event management.

- Electronic timing, Eventor and on-line entry
- Permitting for events
- Localisation

Electronic timing introduced SI boxes on stands and then locks and wires to protect them. The club lost two SI boxes to theft at our first electronic timing event! Electronic timing streamlined quite a few tasks associated with our events, but they have made the process of control placement and collection more complicated. It takes more time to place and collect controls. The use of a computer has almost eliminated all of the post-event work in the analogue age, but the operation of the computer at the event seems to act as a barrier to potential volunteers. It often requires a tent for protection. Our easy erection tents can't fit in a car boot so we need a club trailer. So someone needs to be able to tow the trailer. Not everyone has a tow bar on their vehicle.

In the 1990s we didn't need to apply for permits for events. At the breakup event at the end of the year we had a blank whiteboard, a selection of maps and marker pen. Anyone interested in organising an event chose a map and a date and wrote it on the whiteboard. Today we have to start the fixture planning process in the middle of the previous year. There is little flexibility. We have to agree to event dates and locations before most volunteers are able to make a commitment to run the events. Permit conditions now stipulate that there is to be no parking off roads. Many of the areas we

had used for event locations are now unsuitable with these conditions. The club is still coming to terms with this issue.

Localisation is my word to describe the preference for organising events closer to home. In the 1990s Melbourne clubs organised enough events distant from Melbourne on good terrain that few Melbourne orienteers saw the need to attend Bendigo local events. Only Bendigo region residents attended Bendigo events. The trend since then has been to organising events closer to home. In the year before Covid-19 the Bendigo club was organising almost three-quarters of the technical bush orienteering events in Victoria. Almost half of the competitors at Bendigo events lived outside the Bendigo region. Our attendance numbers have at times been over 80. Some time ago we expanded from four to five courses to spread the course load and cater to a wider range of orienteering aspirations.

These thoughts have been precipitated by discussions at the last club meeting where we discussed issues of parking and Enter-On-Day procedures. Both of these are challenging for event organisation at the moment, and prompted day-dreams of how easy it was 30 years ago. Our club has for years tried to stay as close to the club ideal of events capable of being organised by one person. The only change we have made has been to seek volunteers to operate the computer. The Bendigo event model has been adopted by other clubs, but I notice when attending these events that those other clubs don't have one or two people organising the event. They have more.

Parking ... by Neil Barr (President)

The permits for our club events require us to park on roadsides and not to park off-road. This can be challenging for event organisers as many of the roads we use are narrow and do not have space for parking. At recent events we have had up to 55 cars and we have not fully complied with our permit requirements. We can all do our bit to reduce this problem.

Organisers: The club is interpreting the permit instructions as avoiding parking on any vegetation. Organisers can help by carefully choosing their event site to minimise the risk of parking on vegetation. How much space is available? Do you need someone to help with parking? Can you start on land that isn't managed by Parks or DEECA? Set an example of where to park.

Competitors: Please don't drive off bare surfaces or roads to park on vegetation. You might have to park further from the event than you wish.

Volunteer to help with parking management: At a number of recent events a few of us have looked at the parking situation and taken on the ad-hoc role of managing parking. If you arrive at the event early, please consider the parking situation and if it looks dubious, volunteer to help manage parking. The organiser will appreciate your help. Arriving drivers will also appreciate well-informed advice on where parking is available.

Enter-On-Day

Operating the event computer can be easy or challenging. What makes the difference is the number of Enter-On-the-Day entries. There will always be EODs for the Easy and Moderate courses and we need to manage these. At a recent event we had 20 EODs, and only a modest proportion of these were on the easier courses. This put strain on the event desk as at one point we had two people managing computer entry, novice instruction and parking. It didn't really work. In the rush, errors in entry were made and this was more work to sort out during the finishing process.

- Please make every effort to enter via Eventor. Entries close Friday evening by which time a reliable weather forecast is available. We all forget sometimes, but we shouldn't forget regularly.
- Consider volunteering to manage the computer. I have just updated the
 instruction book for managing the computer at the event desk. The instructions
 are in the computer box. Look over someone's shoulder to begin learning the
 process.
- Consider volunteering to help with newcomers who might need some instruction.

The club discussed this issue at the most recent meeting. Some issues considered were the missing competitors issue and reporting of participation.

- Limiting EOD entries to Course 4,5. The alternative for harder courses would be an all controls map and no entry into the computer- ie no result.
- Reducing the EOD entry fee down to the normal fee as it clearly isn't a
 disincentive (which one committee member predicted some time ago using
 Game Theory).
- A separate EOD self-entry process using a QR code.
 These matters are still under review. The main criteria considered when assessing any changes will be whether they simplify or complicate event management on the day of the event.
