Course 1 was won by Ben Goonan with Richard Goonan second. Bruce Arthur won course 2 and Alex Tarr course 3. Course 4 was won by Susan Water with Jenny Ball second. John Wilkinson was first in course 5 followed by Fiona Connor second. Well done to everyone esp. Neil Barr and Julie Flynn who manned the assembly area on the day and to those few who helped pack up. The Bendigo (and Heathcote) Bushwalking Book - The Story So Far. By Neil Barr

Two weeks ago the club took delivery of 500 copies of the book 'Take a Forest Walk- Thirty-Five Bushwalks in Bendigo and Heathcote'. The book was written by a small team from Bendigo Orienteers and the local ACF branch. Key contributors were Julie Flynn, Daryl Fleay, Neil Barr and Bronwyn Silver. The book contains descriptions of 35 walks, over 90 photographs of the scenery and wildlife of the area and 43 maps.

The book idea arose in an ACF meeting that was attended by some Bendigo orienteers. Around the table it became clear that a a walking book would be attractive to three parties. The ACF wanted to encourage local residents into the Bendigo forests to learn more about the local environment. The City of Greater Bendigo had just published the results of a recreation survey and discovered that the most popular recreation in the city was walking and was looking for a vehicle to support local walkers. Bendigo Orienteers wanted to encourage map reading and navigation in the forests and attract new participants to our sport. A team quickly self-assembled with strong skills in photography, mapping and layout, and with a deep knowledge of the local forests. The City of Greater Bendigo provided a grant for printing and work started.

After a little over a year of (at times frantic) work, we hosted a book launch at No. 7 Reservoir. Members of our club, the ACF and the City of Greater Bendigo spoke to a gathering of approximately 60 people. Julie was interviewed on local ABC morning program, stimulating a multi-day listener feedback on favourite walks. The book has taken off much more quickly than we expected. After a little over fortnight half of the 500 print run has been sold. The takings are being set aside for a probable second print run.

The last section of the book contains a couple of pages explaining orienteering maps and the sport of orienteering, and invites those who enjoyed using the book to try the sport. In a couple of years we will know if this has been a useful investment of our time to promote the sport. Until then, members may benefit from the creation of two new orienteering maps required to describe two walks in the book.

We're probably all guilty of it at one time or another. Jump in the car, click into Maps, and off we go. We know where we're going, what could go wrong...Whelp.

At the recent O event at Argyle, the area received over 12mm of rain on Friday night. Minor tracks that were only slightly dodgy while placing controls during the day, turned into impassible sludge 12 hours later.

One small car got themselves bogged while driving to the event; rescued by another orienteer in a 4WD. I still don't know where they went, and neither do they. Travelling from the south, they should have been able to follow Mrs Google into a safe all-weather road and make it unscathed to the event. As the course setter(s), we successfully tested both Google and the road itself.

After the small car had given up and gone into Heathcote for a coffee, they then looked at the instructions, followed them, and found the event location.

There was some discussion post-arrival. I think the most salient point was that "We Are Orienteers" ... theoretically capable of reading a map and being able to identify that we are - or not - on the correct road. And perhaps, even, reading the instructions that your course setter puts on Eventor for your edification.

I have been to several events this year (Tallarook and Creswick) where the instructions say very loudly DO NOT FOLLOW GOOGLE. She will lead you up hill and down dale - which may very well be the shortest route - but she will not get you to the event.

Is it time, perhaps, to leave Artificial Intelligence to the muggles. The days of following a VicRoads reference with the yellow newsletter in our lap or scrunched against the steering wheel are long gone, but at least we usually ended up where we were supposed to be. Or, you know,

"always make sure to follow the organiser's driving directions".
